She loves teaching and contributing to tertiary education. Her greatest reward has been seeing her students successfully transition from the university into their roles in society. Her interest in experiments laid the foundation for her current role as Professor of Chemistry and her former role as Chairperson of the School of Science and Technology, one of the largest schools within the institution at the time that she served. In the community, she serves as a volunteer tutor to high school students. Professor Hogg says that chemistry is important because it can lead to the development of new materials to support and enhance life, and it provides economic opportunities.





Nicolette Bethel PhD Associate Professor School of Social Sciences



"At the core of anthropological research is an understanding about the dangers of ethnocentrism--the imposition of Eurocentric norms on societies with very different histories and adaptations—and the commitment to understanding cultures and societies on their own terms.

Dr. Nicolette Bethel is well-known for her contributions to the art community through Ringplay Productions, and even more so for her insightful commentary on everything Bahamian, from politics to beliefs and attitudes. Her degrees in Social Anthropology as well as Language and Literature certainly prepared her for such a path. An Associate Professor at UB for over 20 years, Dr. Bethel explains that anthropology (the comparative study of humans on a global scale) is important to understanding cultures and societies on their own terms. This is critical in The Bahamas, she notes. Her commitment to understanding Bahamian culture is demonstrated in key research she has conducted on the economic impact of Junkanoo and ethnographic research on sustainability (Sustainable Exuma) done in conjunction with Harvard University. When asked why she pursued this field of study, her answer is simple: "I fell in love with it."





Niambi Hall-Campbell Dean PhD Assistant Professor, Psychology School of Social Sciences

Indeed, Niambi Hall-Campbell Dean's passion for her people fuels her work with many community-based projects, including the Indaba Project, Character Day Bahamas, the Academy of Women Entrepreneurs, and the National Reparations Committee, of which she is Chair. Assistant Professor of Psychology at UB, she loves her interactions with students and watching them grow and learn. In fact, many of them have gone on to pursue Master's and Doctoral degrees. Noting that there is a great need for research to guide policy development as it relates to individual and group behavior, Dr. Hall-Campbell Dean hopes to conduct Covid-related stress research in The Bahamas. Teaching Bahamian students and contributing to the development of a national academic institution made UB her best choice.

His area of expertise is psychology, and he is passionate about mental health and wellness. He notes that working at the university gives him the opportunity to impact the lives of young people through teaching but also offers him flexibility, with time needed to conduct research. He plans to pursue research that centres around working with students post Hurricane Dorian and Covid-19 and looks forward to providing community based support for type one diabetics.





Tanya Simms PhD Assistant Professor School of Chemistry, Environmental and Life Sciences

I studied population genetics and forensic science because I was always interested in where people in present-day populations, especially the islands of The Bahamas, originated from."

Dr. Tanya Simms recently contributed to groundbreaking research that examined ancient DNA found in The Bahamas and the Caribbean. The opportunity to conduct such real life "CSI" investigations is what motivated Dr. Simms to pursue this line of study academically. Her creation of island-specific DNA databases for 6 Bahamian islands, as well as for Haiti and Jamaica, can be used in criminal proceedings someday. She remembers being disappointed as a student at the College of The Bahamas that very few of her professors in this field were Bahamian. She hopes that the establishment of a forensic program at UB will change that in the near future; indeed, that is a personal goal of hers.





Paul De Luca PhD Assistant Professor, Biology School of Chemistry, Environmental and Life Sciences

The environment is my living laboratory. It is amazing to do field work in The Bahamas and to showcase the amazing flora and fauna of the islands to my UB students."

Born in Canada, Dr. Paul De Luca is an Assistant Professor at UB and is a renowned entomologist and expert in pollination biology and behavior and communication in insects. Fascinated by biology and nature from childhood, he pursued this passion in college and earned a PhD in this field in 2008. Recently, he has been working on assessing arthropod diversity across the Bahamian archipelago. In close collaboration with the Bahamas National Trust and the Leon Levy Native Plant Preserve, he has provided valuable entomological information on the conservation, collection and verification of Bahamian insects. In 2013. he discovered a new species of insect (called a katydidsimilar to grasshoppers and crickets) on Eleuthera and published his findings in 2016. He continues to work extensively to educate the public about the importance of insects to humans and society, both nationally and internationally.

The Bahamas is not unique in the global shortage of registered nurses. [Therefore,] it has been most rewarding for me to watch the nursing program grow and make a mark in the development of the nursing profession in The Bahamas."

At the time of Dr. Theresa Moxey-Adderley's employment at the University of The Bahamas, she was one of two nurses in The Bahamas with a Master's in Nursing Education, a requirement for writing the Nursing program that would become one of the most commonly selected programs of study at UB. Specialising in Critical Care, Pediatrics, Trauma, HIV/AIDS, and Gender-Based Violence, Dr. Moxey-Adderley's influence extends beyond the academic halls into the community. In addition to participating in the Nursing School's accreditation process, she also hopes to partner with local hotels and/or Airbnbs to offer a base rate for women experiencing

domestic violence and needing overnight shelter.
